#### Pastor Patty's Ponderings on Pentecost

Taken from the May 19 from Leader Magazine, Spring 2024 by Lois Siemens and Patty Friesen

Ten women in five canoes headed out on the Churchill River system in Saskatchewan towards a cabin in the woods. Lois Siemens and I were part of that journey. We crossed five lakes and paddled around sixteen kilometers that day. All the forests on all the lakes were burnt from the fires of 2015-2021. The beautiful purple fireweed drew our attention along with the small bushes and baby trees growing through the soot. However, the accumulated fires from every province in Canada together with the burnt stumps everywhere we looked, felt devastating. No birdsong or the telltale rustling in the bushes of small animals greeted us. Only silence, the sound of our paddles in the water and our conversation were carried on the wind. The fire destroyed disease, dead wood, opened the forest canopy, and burst seed cones to renew the forest.

In Pentecost, we are exploring how the fire of the Holy Spirit strengthened the disciples in order to burst open their potential. The Holy Spirit turned them from a group of individuals into a community; from passive to active; from fear to freedom. The Spirit strengthens the foundations of our lives. It cleans up diseased areas, bursts open hard to crack hearts, and unblocks the way for wind, sun and rain to renew the face of our ground so we can be transformed into fearless witnesses, the body of Christ and a renewed earth.

Pentecost Season takes us through the summer. In worship we hope to tie the Season of the Spirit together with Spirit songs and stories. I hope to lead a sermon series on Life Worth Living based on a Yale freshman theology course and book by that title exploring work, call, health, wealth, marriage, parenting, happiness and unhappiness.

In one year from now, May 2025, Anabaptist communities around the world will have an opportunity to commemorate Anabaptism's 500 years of existence. There is much to ponder about commemorating, given the evolving nature of the tradition and its geographical reach. The

Anabaptist movement began in Europe but eventually also found footing in the Americas and the Global South. Like many religious traditions, Anabaptism cannot easily be defined by clearly marked boundaries and characteristics. Over the centuries, the tradition has become more like a multi-colored tapestry shaped by fluid and overlapping religious cultures. Commemorating will mean different things to different people, and these "moments of memory activation" are an occasion for us to consider what narratives are worth telling. (Vision 2024)

We are beginning to recognize our 500th anniversary already with occasional sermon series on Anabaptism and Sunday school Forums on Anabaptist history like Conform: Mennonites and the Mexican Migration film on Sun. May 12, 11:00. We have a rich history that we can be proud of despite its' quirkiness and a global identity that we can continue to explore in our local spiritual context. **By the Water**, is a graphic novel about Felix Manz that the youth hope to study this next year. MC Canada is sending young adults to Zurich, Switzerland next May for anniversary celebrations. Stay tuned for other opportunities to learn and grow.
