# Lighting the Advent Wreath at Home

"The people who walked in darkness/have seen a great light..." (Isaiah 9:1) Our lives are an "advent," a "coming" from our time to the time of God. We live our advents in the eternal hope and expectation of the ever-burning light of God's risen One, the perfect Light who shatters the darkness of separation.

The Advent wreath originated from the custom of German and Northern European communities of fashioning wreaths or wheels of candles to light their homes during the cold, dark days of winter. By the nineteenth century, the Advent wreath had become the devotion we know today. In our own busy whirl of shopping, decorating, cooking and celebrating during the holiday season, the Advent wreath is a beautiful and simple ritual for individuals, families and communities to keep the real meaning of Christmas before us.

The four candles of the Advent wreath represent the four weeks of Advent and the thousands of years that the people of God awaited the promised Messiah. The candles are purple, the liturgical colour of penance and prayer that marks the Advent season (one of the candles may be rose for the Third Sunday of Advent, traditionally known as Mary's Sunday.). Each week, one candle is lit until all four are aglow on the Fourth Sunday of Advent, December 24.

The round wreath itself symbolizes the eternity of God throughout human history. Evergreen branches are often used in decorating the wreath, reminds us of the evergreen or eternal life of God in Christ.

### For a daily candle lighting at breakfast or supper:

Candle lighter: The night is far spent; the day draws near.

All: The light of God has dawned, shattering the darkness.

Reading: Romans 13:11b-12. (May be best read at breakfast!) It is the hour now for you to awake from sleep! For our salvation is nearer now than when we first believed; the day is at hand. Let us then throw off the works of darkness and put on the light. (*Pause for reflection.*)

L: As we await the coming of Jesus, the Light and Word of God, let us join our hearts in prayer that prayer and our interactions may be the light that shatters the winter darkness, we pray

All: Christ, be our light.

L: That all our Christmas preparations will proclaim the joy of the Saviour's coming, we pray...

All: Christ, be our light.

L: That the risen Jesus may bring our friends and relatives to dwell with him, (especially...) we pray...

All: Christ, be our light.

L: Holy God, we await the dawning of your Light, Jesus Christ. May his coming dispel the darkness of hatred and violence, of fear and despair. Illuminate our home with the light of Christ's peace and mercy, that our house may be a place of welcome to all who knock on our door and come to our table. We ask this in the name of Jesus, your Light to the world.

All: Amen.

Advent Services: In our Scriptures, we hear the stories of those who have been waiting, waiting, waiting to hear from God, who have felt the silence of God as they long for restoration, for vindication, for hope. We, too, have been those who wait. When we watch the news, when we hear of wars and rumors of war, when children don't have enough to eat, when cancers and illnesses impact lives, we cry out with our spiritual ancestors, "How long, O Lord?" How long must we wait? The answer is not forthcoming, yet we know: God is with us in the waiting.

# Mennonite Church SK Leadership Assembly on Camps At Eigenheim, Saturday November 25

Due to high liability but low involvement in daily operations of church-owned but not church-run MC SK Camps - the MC SK Camps Subcommittee proposes:

- 1. Not selling camps.
- 2. Incorporating camps (like RJC was incorporated decades ago)
- 3. Paying costs for incorporation.
- 4. Leasing land to camps.

Pros: more intentional relationship between MC SK and camps like with RJC, camp board independence to diversify board members and form other alliances with environmental groups, etc. with broader donor base.

Cons: less control/ theological influence on camps (which is limited anyhow). Elim and Youth Farm more financially viable than Shekinah due to other income streams.

We love our camps and see these proposals as more operationally responsible. Feel free to talk to Patty and Luke, MC SK about these proposals. More to come at MC SK Annual Delegate Session March 8/9 North Star Mennonite Church, Drake.

### **MCC**

Petition for Peace @ mcc.org.

Dear Prime Minister, I lament the unfolding tragedy in Palestine and Israel and mourn the lives that have been lost already. I oppose the use of violence as a response to injustice or as retaliation for violence. I urge world leaders to encourage immediate de-escalation, including calling for a ceasefire, and hold all parties to the same standard of international law regarding the protection of civilians and respect for human rights.

As you consider how to respond, I ask that you: (1) Urge restraint and de-escalation, including calling for a ceasefire and release of hostages, rather than support militarized responses that will only increase violence, leading to more civilian deaths and a worsened humanitarian crisis. Urge all actors to prioritize the preservation of human life above all else. (2) Support funding and urge access to humanitarian aid, particularly for residents in Gaza, and all those impacted by conflict. (3) Hold all parties accountable for upholding international law, including by opposing the bombing and killing of civilians by both Hamas and Israel. (4) Work with the international community to address underlying systems of oppression that create circumstances ripe for violence, including the military occupation of Palestine, the Gaza blockade, lack of equal rights and self-determination, and the inability to meet basic needs. I urge you to work constructively toward a future where all Palestinians and Israelis can live in peace.

#### **MDS NEWS**

Hello Church,

Many times, the disasters we respond to are large. That was in the case in Cape Breton, where we repaired 44 homes damaged by Hurricane Fiona. But sometimes it's just one house we fix up or rebuild. That's what's happening in Alberta following a tornado in Carstairs.

Led by the Alberta Unit, we are building a new home for a multigenerational household of Elisa Humphreys, her son, daughter-inlaw and their family.

Both families lost their houses when the tornado struck on July 1. When Elisa returned to her property after the tornado passed by, "everything was gone," she said. "Vanished. All there was was a debris field. Even the fence posts were sucked right out of the ground." (You can read the full story about the tornado in the link below.)

The community turned out to clean up the property, but now MDS is providing them with a new home where they will live together. To make that possible, a total of \$120,000 is needed for materials. ### **MDS Early Response explained**

Early Response, which begins when search-and-rescue is complete, can be removing trees, tarping houses, or mucking out houses after a flood. If a roof is partially blown off, we may tarp that roof to mitigate further damage. Or a fallen tree might be resting on the house, and we might saw the tree off, then tarp the roof so the rain doesn't come in.

# MC Sask Council is pleased to announce the creation a new Special Projects Fund

When reviewing current finances, Council determined that MC Sask's current reserves held a significant surplus, and that the funds could be put to better use by congregations and related organizations. Tim Wiens, MC Sask Finance Chair, states "Previous Councils had set aside specified donations and bequests to be used as a reserve fund. We determined that these dollars had grown to a level where some could be best used now, rather than waiting for a time in the future. We will still have a reserve fund that would cover potential shut down costs and budget shortfalls."

These funds can provide opportunities both within MC Sask and to other related organizations. The special projects would be one-time endeavors designed to build organizational capacity, or seed money for new programs. All MC Sask programs and related organizations are encouraged to apply. The next submission deadline is February 1. 2024.

Interim Moderator, Sharon Schultz adds "There may be new ideas from our related organizations that need co-funding to be implemented. Budgets are tight with many organizations and if we can provide some financing to help get these new projects started, we are pleased to offer assistance. Projects of a capital construction are eligible.
