⁸See, I am going to bring them from the land of the north,

and gather them from the farthest parts of the earth, among them the blind and the lame, those with child and those in labor, together; a great company, they shall return here.

⁹ With weeping they shall come, and with consolations^[a] I will lead them back, I will let them walk by brooks of water, in a straight path in which they shall not stumble; for I have become a father to Israel, and Ephraim is my firstborn.

Hebrews 7:23-28

²³ Furthermore, the former priests were many in number, because they were prevented by death from continuing in office; ²⁴ but Jesus holds his priesthood permanently, because he continues forever. ²⁵ Consequently Jesus is able for all time to save those who approach God through him, since he always lives to make intercession for them.

²⁶ For it was fitting that we should have such a high priest, holy, blameless, undefiled, separated from sinners, and exalted above the heavens. ²⁷ Unlike the other high priests, Jesus has no need to offer sacrifices day after day,

first for his own sins, and then for those of the people; this he did once for all when he offered himself. ²⁸ For the law appoints as high priests those who are subject to weakness, but the word of the oath, which came later than the law, appoints a Son who has been made perfect forever.

Mark 10:46-52 (NRSV) The Healing of Blind Bartimaeus

⁴⁶ They came to Jericho. As he and his disciples and a large crowd were leaving Jericho, Bartimaeus son of Timaeus, a blind beggar, was sitting by the roadside. ⁴⁷ When he heard that it was Jesus of Nazareth, he began to shout out and say, "Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me!" ⁴⁸ Many sternly ordered him to be quiet, but he cried out even more loudly, "Son of David, have mercy on me!" ⁴⁹ Jesus stood still and said, "Call him here." And they called the blind man, saying to him, "Take heart; get up, he is calling you." ⁵⁰ So throwing off his cloak, he sprang up and came to Jesus. ⁵¹ Then Jesus said to him, "What do you want me to do for you?" The blind man said to him, "My teacher, let me see again." ⁵² Jesus said to him, "Go; your faith has made you well." Immediately he regained his sight and followed him on the way.

OMC 90 Story by Otto Driedger (edited): Childhood experiences

- Sunday School, Harry Boldt teaching; many curtains strung up in the sanctuary to separate the various classes.
- Reverend Pauls preaching; learning the basics of High German through sermons and songs.
- The policy in the Rosenorter congregations to have the pastors do pulpit exchanges. Often visiting pastors would stay at our place for night or for dinner.
- Fooling around with friends while learning the songs for the Christmas program; I was not much for singing, but fun with friends was worth being there; Christmas Eve was special.

- The singing of Mr. Peter Kasdorf who sang in a noticeably loud, piercing voice. It demonstrated joy and gusto.
- The sanctuary benches on the far left basically for women and children, on the far right for men and children. The centre row the benches for anyone who wanted to sit in a non-gender oriented context. Younger couples often sat there.

Teen-age experiences

- (Then) there was not a Saskatchewan Mennonite Conference, but there were sessions of the ministers in the Rosenorter congregations. Sometimes they would meet at our home. (My brothers and I) would meet them when they were having "Faspa".
- Brother Leo and the Kruger boys had a quartet that would sing, especially at Sunday evening "Christian Endeavors". These Sunday evening services were especially important for us youth. They were operated with youth very much involved both in planning and presentation - singing groups, poems, short devotionals.
- There were two or three evening evangelistic services. One evangelist provided many "sayings". For example "The greatest graveyard is where hidden talent lies buried". This stayed with me.
- Funerals were important milestones (and) were solemn affairs. The services and graveside events were supportive and comforting for family, friends and the community.
- Youth is the time I was baptized. The catechism sessions were part of the morning service when those to be baptized were asked the questions and the pastor would comment on the meaning. This was beneficial for the catechists but also for the congregation, they were reminded of the basics of the faith from year to year.

Osler Mennonite Church was and is a congregation that has historically nurtured its children, youth, adults and seniors on their journey of discipleship. Encouraging us to follow Christ and open to respond to new challenges and dimensions of discipleship and service.
