The people I love the best jump into work head first without dallying in the shallows and swim off with sure strokes almost out of sight. They seem to become natives of that element, the black sleek heads of seals bouncing like half-submerged balls.

I love people who harness themselves, an ox to a heavy cart, who pull like water buffalo, with massive patience, who strain in the mud and the muck to move things forward, who do what has to be done, again and again.

I want to be with people who submerge in the task, who go into the fields to harvest and work in a row and pass the bags along, who are not parlour generals and field deserters but move in a common rhythm when the food must come in or the fire be put out.

The work of the world is common as mud. Botched, it smears the hands, crumbles to dust. But the thing worth doing well done has a shape that satisfies, clean and evident. Greek amphoras for wine or oil, Hopi vases that held corn, are put in museums but you know they were made to be used. The pitcher cries for water to carry and a person for work that is real.

Nora's Notes

The shooting at Robb Elementary School early this week has left us reeling with overwhelming heartache as we try to find a way to not just acknowledge the pain of this event but find a way forward that responds to the injustice and violence imbedded in this news story.

I found myself struggling to listen to friends' words that 'hopefully this will finally change something' because I felt so cynical at the evil and complicate actions that have consistently followed these horrific events in the past.

Today I listened to a podcast that gave me a new definition of hope, told me about the real progress that has been made in the past decade around gun legislation in the states, and gave me tangible steps that I can take today.

The hosts told me that hope isn't a feeling that we can simply muster to believe things will get better. Instead, hope is a discipline. It is persistent commitment to actions that make this world a more just, loving, beautiful world.

I have often felt that being a person of faith for me, is being a person that is fervently committed to living a life in the actions of disciplined hope.

I understand if you don't want to listen to this podcast, because I didn't want to. I didn't want to read the news story either. It all feels like to much, because it is to much. But this episode is not meant to simply be a way for us to watch the trauma others are experiencing, it is a way to bring us together and show us a way forward.

It is still hard, and it has a few swears (warning for those sensitive to this); but I am hear to talk with you at the end of it. Or to sit in silence with you at the end of it. Soybeans by Thomas Alan Orr

The October air was warm and musky, blowing Over brown fields, heavy with the fragrance Of freshly combined beans, the breath of harvest.

He was pulling a truckload onto the scales
At the elevator near the rail siding north of town.
When a big Cadillac drove up. A man stepped out,
Wearing a three-piece suit and a gold pinky ring.
The man said he had just invested a hundred grand
In soybeans and wanted to see what they looked like.

The farmer stared at the man and was quiet, reaching For the tobacco in the rear pocket of his jeans, Where he wore his only ring, a threadbare circle rubbed By working cans of dip and long hours on the backside Of a hundred acre run. He scooped up a handful Of small white beans, the pearls of the prairie, saying:

Soybeans look like a foot of water on the field in April When you're ready to plant and can't get in; Like three kids at the kitchen table Eating macaroni and cheese five nights in a row; Or like a broken part on the combine when Your credit with the implement dealer is nearly tapped.

Soybeans look like prayers bouncing off the ceiling When prices on the Chicago grain market start to drop; Or like your old man's tears when you tell him How much the land might bring for subdivisions. Soybeans look like the first good night of sleep in weeks. When you unload at the elevator and the kids get Christmas.

He spat a little juice on the tire of the Cadillac, Laughing despite himself and saying to the man: Now maybe you can tell me what a hundred grand looks like.
