

# Nora Pederberg , our interim Pastor of Faith & Community, tells us a little bit about herself:

My experience in church ministry starts with a focus on working with children and youth, ranging from teaching Sunday school, leading Vacation Bible School weeks, and later spending three summers as a counsellor at Shekinah Summer Camp. I see this time as a joyful period of learning what it means to create a safe place for children and youth to feel comfortable being silly, curious, or scared with an awareness of God's presence in their lives. The context of ministry took a shift for me on an internship with Servants Vancouver which allowed me to live out daily life along-side those who were facing barriers such as addiction, mental health, homelessness, and extensive trauma. I was able to learn how to accompany people as they continued to seek out healing and resilience. Upon leaving this environment and returning to university my mentor advised me to explore what it means to live "incarnationally" where I found myself in my current communities. I returned with a new perspective to both my studies and my involvement with my Winnipeg congregation of Home Street Mennonite Church, where I continued to fall in love with active participation in a community of faith including the opportunity to preach, as well as join a congregational visitation list. It is the culmination of these experiences, and the training received in my degree, that led me to undertake a personal discernment process around my place within the field of ministry. This has resulted in exploring a calling to pastoral work in congregational ministry during an interim pastoral position at Nutana Park Mennonite Church covering three different ministry positions throughout the year and experience a number of different elements of what it means to work within a church congregation.

Currently I feel rooted in a call to pastoral work, and I am continuing to unfold what this means for my life. I have returned back to the same river and treaty land, but now live in the city of Saskatoon with my husband Matt in the community house Vine & Table. Thank you for considering me for the maternity leave position at Osler Mennonite Church.

# Birds Around Us -submitted by Jake Buhler

"Look Mommy, I see a bird". When you hear this, a new bird watcher has been found. We are all bird watchers, albeit, some more experienced than others. If you know the name of one bird, you know something about birds!

**The Bible** has names for about 40 birds. There are about 145 common species of birds in Saskatchewan. But bird expert, Alan Smith, says that 400 species have been identified in this province.

**Year-round birds:** Black-capped chickadees, black-billed magpies, house sparrows, and the common raven stay around our area all year. **Summer Birds:** True migratory birds that live in southern USA or South America in the winter, and join us in the summer include most hawks, geese, robins, kingbirds, meadowlarks, ducks, pelicans and killdeer.

**Semi-migratory birds:** These include Bohemian Waxwings and Redpolls that live up north in the summer and come south to our area in the winter. I photographed the bohemian waxwing shown below in my front yard in Saskatoon.

**Colony Bird**: Purple martins are attracted to human-built houses with many little dwellings. We have a purple martin colony house on the church yard.

An **Unusual Bird** must be the house-wren: The male house-wren arrives in our area a week or two before the female does. For a week or more, it finds at least 2 places for its mate to lay eggs. When the female arrives, she chooses the favorite nest. Only after that will she agree to be the male's partner. They mate and eggs are laid, and the young are hatched.

The **rarest bird** must be the whooping crane. Nesting locations are in the Territories north of Saskatchewan. About 200 birds in the wild exist. They fly in small groups of 5 or 6. But Wilf Buhler photographed 13 birds (10 are shown below) at Buzz Lake, which is one of the largest groups ever photographed. Bruce Boldt and Gordon Allaby were also observing these birds in 2008. Buzz Lake is a stopping off place for the whoopers.

**Largest Bird:** The tallest bird is the whooping crane at 1.4 meters. The pelican has the biggest wing span of 9 feet or about 2.8 meters. **Bird Bander:** Bruce Boldt is a bird expert and bands various species including owls.
