This month I want to highlight three heroes of faith who died this year – Ron Sider, leader of Evangelicals for Social Action, Frederick Buechner, author and theologian and Desmond Tutu, archbishop and apartheid activist. All three shaped how I saw the world and Christian response to it. With the Queen's death as well, it reminds me that all our lives are short even when they are long and rich and full. Death reminds me how to live and makes me want to live it to the fullest with intention and great faith.

November also reminds me to be thankful since we also celebrate American Thanksgiving in our home. I'm thankful for our new Pastor of Faith and Community Luke Bushman. It was a nine-month long process of advertising and Zooming as a search committee with Nutana Park and praying to our Great Match-Maker. We're expecting nothing short of the Messiah so please pray for Luke as he finds his way with us.

# The Anabaptist Bible Project for the 500th Anniversary 2025

Google Anabaptism at 500 to learn more. Interested in being a part of a 4-week Bible study in January/February? Please let Pastor Patty know.

Central to the Anabaptist movement of the 16th century was the conviction that the Bible was intended to be read and interpreted by ordinary people in the common language of the day. The movement flourished as young men and women from all walks of life began to read Scripture together and hold themselves accountable to its message, especially the teachings of Jesus in the Gospels. In the centuries that followed, Scripture continued to sustain Anabaptist congregations, convicting, encouraging, and transforming believers in settings all around the world just as it did in the 16th century.

In 2025, the global Anabaptist church will commemorate the five hundredth anniversary of Anabaptist beginnings. This occasion offers a unique opportunity to renew the movement in the 21st century by inviting readers—believers and unbelievers, young people and older people, earnest seekers and the indifferent—to engage Scripture anew through the distinctive lens of the Anabaptist tradition.

The Anabaptist Bible is the first attempt to create a study Bible from an Anabaptist perspective. Like *The Lutheran Study Bible* and *The Catholic Study Bible*, it will include commentary and insights from leading biblical scholars. But the Anabaptist Bible will also reflect an approach distinctive to the Anabaptist tradition by including insights, comments, and questions in the form of marginal notes generated by five hundred Bible study groups of lay Anabaptists Christians.

In the coming year, Anabaptist believers from many different cultural contexts, backgrounds, ethnicities, and ages will gather around specific passages of Scripture. Attentive to the Holy Spirit, they will share insights, wisdom, and questions as they engage these texts. The conversations generated by these study groups—reproduced in the form of marginal notes in the Anabaptist Bible—will both reflect the careful work of the "hermeneutical community" and invite readers to continue that work for generations to come.

You and your faith community can participate in creating the Anabaptist Bible, joining hundreds of other Anabaptist Bible study groups who will collectively read and interpret every passage of Scripture - from Genesis 1:1 to Revelation 22:21.

Take your part in a radical tradition of ordinary people reading Scripture together, trusting that the Holy Spirit will inspire, comfort, unsettle, and transform God's people today, just as it has in the past.

## Pastor Luke's Book Recommendations

#### Following Jesus by Henry Nouewen

This book was beautifully written, and felt like talking to a very gentle friend about how to better follow Jesus. Nouewen focuses on the invitational loving nature of Jesus. At the time I read it- a time coming out of Bible college and heated theological debates, while working in a place where I felt alone and confused sometimes, it was refreshing to be reminded of Jesus' character. To be reminded that Jesus wasn't the one heaping pressure and anxiety and expectations on me- Jesus was, as always, just inviting me to come and see.

#### Cost of Discipleship by Dietrich Bonhoeffer

I have always struggled with how to understand works vs faith. While I always heard growing up that my salvation wasn't about what I did, it seemed Christianity had so many expectations attached to it. Bonhoeffer's explanation of Cheap Grace vs Costly Grace, helped me to realize that as we discover more and more the beauty of God's grace, we are simply compelled to live differently. Compelled not ordered.

#### Love Wins by Rob Bell

Obviously, a controversial book in some circles, but this book stuck with me because it felt like Bell vocalized the questions that everyone asks about Christianity. I still have a lot of questions about the concept of hell, and no matter what I conclude about it, this book helped me ask the questions I have always had so I can more thoroughly think through the concept of eternity.

#### The Shack by William P Young

I cried a lot reading this book. It has stuck with me over the years for two reasons. First, the way it addressed the horrible things that happen in the world, and God's love and compassion in the midst of those things. Second it expanded my very narrow view of what the trinity might look and be like. I had always been told that God had no gender, but had never thought of God as feminine until reading this book.

These are a few of the books that have really stuck with me. In the interview I mainly focused on how reading scripture and theological is a spiritual practice I do. Just want to clarify that isn't to say these are the only spiritual practices I see value in or do, they are just the ones that come most naturally and that I enjoy most. Prayer, meditation, and solitude for example are all great practices that I try to do, they just aren't as natural for me.

#### **Mennonite Disaster Service**

Hello Church,

"People are really thankful. They can't imagine we are doing it for free." That's what Nick Hamm of the MDS Ontario Unit said about the tree cutting service MDS is providing Nova Scotia following Hurricane Fiona.

"They can't believe people do this sort of thing as volunteers," he said. "We tell them we are doing it because that's what our faith calls us to do, to help our neighbours."

Helping neighbours when they have experienced a disaster is the reason MDS exists. Since the 1950s, people in Canada and the U.S. have felt God's call to respond when people are need. They still feel that call today, volunteering or donating to help us help people whose homes have been damaged or destroyed.

While that goal hasn't changed, what's different today is the idea of neighbour. At first, it meant helping people in a local community, state or province. But for MDS today it means anyone in Canada or the U.S. who has been impacted by a disaster—like people in Atlantic Canada.

That is where we have an urgent need right now for volunteers to help with clean-up. In Cape Breton, where we are working, many trees were blown down and many people have damaged roofs. We need experienced chain saw operators and roofers over the next few weeks to cut up fallen trees and tarp roofs for the winter. We also need lots of people to help assist with moving cut up trees and general clean-up.

For most of us who support MDS in Canada, Atlantic Canada is far away. But the people there are our neighbours, too. They need our help. In particular, we want to help those who, due to age, illness, disability or lack of resources, can't do the work themselves.
