*Today: Refugee Sponsorship Meeting after the worship service: OMC members have been looking into the possibility of sponsoring a refugee family. At a Sept. meeting, 5 church members were willing to join a committee, and nearly 20 indicated ways they could help. Since then, the owner of a home in the city, suitable for a small family, has offered to rent at a very reasonable rate. This cuts the cost of a year's support from about \$27,000 to possibly less than \$20,000. MCC offered to connect us with other people in the city who are keen to help. Mennonite World Conference – Prayers of Gratitude and Intercession

Commentary: Our world groans by Daniel Horne December 3, 2015 - Mennonite Church Canada, Winnipeg, Manitoba

Like Lent and most other Christian holidays, Advent was traditionally a time of sacrifice, fasting and personal reflection leading up to Christ's birth. Following Christ's birth, we celebrated the 12 Days of Christmas with feasts, gift giving, and worship. But these days, the reverence of Advent seems lost.

As the cold deepens and the daylight grows shorter, we fight against inner darkness and allow Advent to be overtaken by the celebrations that normally follow it. Months of consumption, feasting and festivities begin as early as November and carry over into the New Year – and they are often followed by months of debt and dieting. Just after Halloween (Oct. 31) this year, veterans were compelled to appeal publically for Canadians to delay the clamour of Christmas advertising and consumption until after Remembrance Day (Nov. 11) as a sign of respect.

Many of us currently have access to more material possessions than we could ever possibly need and yet for numerous people, Christmas is psychologically the most difficult time of the year. Energy decreases as stress rises. Our world groans with uncertainty over finances and the economy, war, terrorism, refugee migration, crosscultural relationships, governance and oil. Congregations wrestle with issues of their own, such as aging, finances, sexuality and an uncertain future.

For some reason, we tend to believe these concerns are particular to our time and place, yet Christ's own birth was surrounded by uncertainty, political turmoil and the mystery of the coming Messiah. In Luke 2:10 we are assured by the familiar words, "Do not be afraid. I bring you good news that will cause great joy for all the people." In light of the coming "good news" I urge you to take some time this advent season to:

1. Mentally and spiritually prepare yourself for Christ's birth. As the season grows darker and colder, take time to be still and to listen to the quiet voice of God.

2. Physically align yourself with the anticipation and make sacrifices this advent. Fasting before a feast will help you to appreciate the feast even more.

3. Be generous and care for our most vulnerable.

4. Put down your smartphone and make eye contact with those around you. Surround yourself with loved ones, reconcile relationships, enjoy the presence of strangers.

5. Like Mary in Luke 1:46-55, wait in humble anticipation and give thanks in a time of uncertainty. For a moment, stop trying to figure out what the future will bring and remember that our future is in God's hands and imagination. God is faithful.

I invite you to take a step back and prepare yourself for the Celebration of Christ's birth. If this season you feel the world around you groaning (Romans 8:19) in the cold dark days leading up to Christmas, share what you are hearing and feeling with others. May this be a meaning-filled Advent.
