From Fra Giovanni to Countess Allagia, Christmas Eve, 1513 (applies to our Easter joy)

I am your friend and my love for you goes deep. This is nothing I can give you which you have not. But there is much, very much, that, while I cannot give it, you can take. No heaven can come to us unless our hearts find rest in today. Take heaven! No peace lies in the future which is not hidden in this present little instant. Take peace! The gloom of the world is but a shadow. Behind it, yet within our reach, is joy. There is radiance and glory in the darkness, could we but see. And to see, we have only to look. I beseech you to look!

Life is generous a giver, but we, judging its gifts by the covering, cast them away as ugly or heavy or hard. Remove the covering, and you will find beneath it a living splendor, woven of love by wisdom, with power. Welcome it, grasp it, touch the angel's hand that brings it to you.

Everything we call a trial, a sorrow or a ditty, believe me, that angel's hand is there, the gift is there, and the wonder of an overshadowing presence. Your joys, too, be not content with them as joys. They, too conceal diviner gifts.

* OMC Commitment to Saskatoon Friendship Inn

OMC youth set the Friendship Inn service example earlier this year, and they now have extended this commitment for a further six months. On March 26th, the Mission and Service Committee agreed to be the lead on this project and committed OMC to assist our youth in providing 1-day a month service, for a six-month "trial" period, to Friendship Inn. Sounds interesting? Sounds like a worthy service project? Might be something you would do? They serve meals to poor people...right??

Let's find out a little bit more about what Friendship Inn (FI) is:

- A few concerned individuals started FI as a soup kitchen, in 1969. Today, the soup kitchen or food service program has expanded to include other programs for Saskatoon people living in poverty
- Many of FI clients have mental illness and addiction issues
- FI does not receive government funding. It relies on community donations, grants and partnerships to provide regular meal service and fellowship
- FI needs about \$5,000 per day to cover costs, or around \$1.825 million per year. There current maxim is "\$5 will feed 1 person for 1 day"
- "(FI) believe(s) in community development, public education and advocacy to encourage solutions to poverty in our city"
- "FI is responsive, compassionate and fosters a sense of belonging"

...and what Friendship Inn does:

- FI is open from 8 am to 2 pm, 365 days a year. It serves both breakfast and lunch for a total 600-1,000 meals each day
- FI non-meal programs include mom and baby clinics, diabetes clinics, client legal services and addictions counseling

- FI provides individual and group services and programs to children, youth and adults experiencing poverty
- FI meals and services are "served without cost or judgment and in a compassionate spirit"

OMC has agreed to provide 8-10 volunteers for lunch service on April 18, May 16, June 20, July 18 and August 15.

Sign up sheets are on the church bulletin board or call Sandra 239-4999. If these dates do not suit your schedule, or in addition to serving meals, please consider making a **donation** through OMC designated to FI **or leave food and other items in the OMC collection box**. Requested items include diapers size 3/4/5, baby formula, peanut butter, jam, pancake mix.

The Mission and Service Committee is enthusiastic about OMC's commitment to our trial service period with Friendship Inn. We anticipate a much longer-term partnership will develop! Thank you for your responsive and compassionate support to a basic need not available to everyone in Saskatoon.

What color is snow?
