#### Pastor's Note

I read an article about a pastor who encourages all his adult parishioners to share with him what they would like said at their funerals. He keeps a file for each individual containing her/his wishes and the desired message to be presented at that person's funeral. For practical reasons, having a compilation of information on hand would simplify the process of preparing for a funeral. The events between death and burial are usually full, often chaotic and laden with emotions for all who are involved in planning the funeral. Enacting the content of the decease's file would be much like executing a will; however, there is a big difference between dispersing assets and presenting a life once lived. The whole idea felt too clinical, sterile and ... controlling. I humorously thought to myself as I read the concept, "I wonder if his church gives a discount if a person pre-books the day of the funeral?"

The pastor also said that there is another benefit to asking people's input about their funeral: it gets them thinking about their life and how to put it into words. I don't agree with his proposal. I will gladly honour any "broad brush stroke" requests, such as lots of singing or even a favourite scripture passage to be read, and I'll keep a file for anyone who wants to share such things with me. Yet, I believe one of the wonderful gifts of death is that it forces us to finally understand that we are not in control. I think it would be a shame to encourage anyone to assume that he/she can reach into this realm once she/he has moved on. Moreover, funerals are for the living / the survivors, and they will think and say how they feel. Contemplating how others will regard us, once we are dead, is far more thought provoking and soul-troubling, than crafting our own memorial. And, that is something to think about.

\*Mennonite Church Canada is one of a small group of churches calling on government leaders to address issues of **climate justice**. Increasing numbers of people are being affected by drought or flooding, displacement and reduced access to food – conditions that can lead to violence as people struggle to survive. It's not a matter of whose science is correct, says Willard Metzger, Executive Director of Mennonite Church Canada. The planet and all that is in it is a gift from God, and we have not been treating this gift with the respect it deserves. ## **Potluck Recipe of the Month**



Thank you, Leslie Allaby, for being willing to share this month's featured recipe; a Sweet and Crunchy Broccoli Salad that is perfect for church potlucks. Yum!

#### Sweet and Crunchy Broccoli Salad

1lb bacon 1 large head broccoli 1/2 head cauliflower Medium red onion, chopped fine 1c. raisins 1/2 c. sunflower seeds

Fry one pound of bacon until crispy and crumble into tiny bits. Chop broccoli and cauliflower int 1/2 in. chunks. Slice onion, chop up fine and add to the vegetables. Mix in raisins and sunflower seeds. Toss with dressing below. Chill and serve.

#### Dressing:

Stir together 1 c. salad dressing or mayonnaise, 1/2 c. sugar and 2T vinegar. Mix well with salad.
