2014 WEEK OF PRAYER theme: FOR CHRISTIAN UNITY

The roots of the "Week of Prayer" go back to the 1800s; it is one of the oldest, most widely observed ecumenical events in the world. We are all encouraged to let the entire year be permeated by the spirit of this Week. Hopefully, the guiding materials will help us find ways to express the degree of communion already given to the churches, and to pray together that we may be more fully united one with another, and all of us with Christ.

Traditionally, the "Week of Prayer" is held from January 18 to 25. This is the octave proposed by Paul Wattson in 1908, because it begins with the feast of St. Peter and ends with the feast of the conversion of St. Paul. Finding ways to pray together during this January week means that we are in harmony with people around the world, which brings its own graces; in this way, we join with all who are praying, reflecting, studying, and even eating and drinking together to celebrate and pray for Christian unity.

On Sunday, January 19, we will gather for worship during the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity. We will respond to God's call to us, and we will seek to be renewed and to build up our mutual relationship in Christ through song, word and gesture. A focal passage will be: 1 Corinthians 1:1-17 where we recognize Paul's provocative question – "Has Christ been divided?" – as a joyful challenge to prayer and to self-examination as persons and as Christian communities. This biblical text and worship outline is an opportunity to consider that challenge anew in your context.

I hope the theme of Christian Unity will also sharpen our understanding of how God is leading us, individually and as a church, in 2014.

Praying the Psalms: The Psalms are filled with words of fear as the writers faced their greatest horrors – violence, illness, depression, death. The lines of Psalm 55:4-5 are a common refrain: "My heart is in anguish within me, the terrors of death have fallen upon me. Fear and trembling come upon me, and horror overwhelms me." This worship book of ancient Israel continues to speak volumes across the centuries. When we listen to these words, sing them, pray with them, and speak them together, we are companioned by the psalmist, and are drawn beyond our fear into hope.

Prayers of Confession: Fear is a normal human experience that is a healthy protective response to danger. However, our fight, flight, or freeze reactions also can lead us into responses that are sinful. When we fight against "the other," discrimination and violence are born. We flee change, uncertainty, or conflict, fighting to maintain control of our lives. In turn, our ability to live authentically with ourselves and with others is broken. When we freeze in the face of fear, we become complacent to the call for faith and transformation. Incorporating practices of communal and personal confession into our worship names these fears and the ways our reactions break our relationships with God, with ourselves, our communities and the earth.

Silence: Often our truest, deepest, most entrenched fears are unrecognized, unvoiced. Yet they are still alive and present. These are the fears we would rather not acknowledge. Ironically, it is in silence that we are able to become aware of what we are truly afraid of. When we enter into silence, we come face-to-face with the deepest parts of ourselves. Using practices of silence in worship – gazing at a prayer visual, praying with guided imagery, reflecting on a question, or just resting in the silence allows us to be present to our fear and release our fear into the care of God.

Words of Assurance: Each of these practices also calls for an assurance of God's presence in the midst of our fear. When we are plunged into the depths of tragedy or wrestle with our inner fear, we need to hear words that speak the abundant love and grace of God. In a community of faith, we speak these words together as a way to hold the light for one another.

- The OMC Worship Committee is comprised of myself, Gordon A, Michelle McKinnell, Lynette J, Kathryn J. As your committee, we are responsible for planning Sunday morning worship and supporting the pastor in that endeavor. We network with deacons and education committee and collaborate where we can on creative worship services throughout the church calendar year.
- As a committee we try to make worship meaningful for everyone from children to adults --- incorporating different styles of music, liturgy, drama, sermons, cultural expressions and more. It's never perfect (it's not a stage production), we strive to be authentic, to involve as many people as possible and ultimately, to help people find space for God in their hearts and minds.
- In a cluttered, noisy world where I work 6 days a week, driving kids to and fro, directing staff, and helping customers in the shop, it's very tempting to ignore the opportunity that Sunday morning church presents. The "church of brunch" or "sleeping in" beckons! A quiet morning at home in my bathrobe with a cup of tea and a magazine sounds delightful. An hour for just me! After all, it's my only day off!
- But I need the discipline of worship and Sabbath. It cuts through the noise and sets me straight. Reminds me whose child I am and of my place on the earth.
- We as individuals make up the church. We deliberately come together as a community to worship God --- through prayer, praise, song, confession, listening and responding.
- I think it's difficult to grow in one's faith without the corporate act of worship and coming together as community. Jesus didn't do it alone and nor should we. We become encourage, empowered and enabled after our encounter with God.

- What is essential to worship? That we invite God to be present and the center of our worship. And I invite you to be present --- every Sunday that you can! Come as you are. You, your family, your friends and even people you don't know very well.
- Everyone! Participate from the pews and at the front of the church in any way you are able! The church needs you! The time is now!
- Our prayer as a worship committee is that we hope you leave church after worship feeling better than when you came --- that you encountered God.
