#### 2017 National Park Sabbatical by Patty Friesen

It seems a little more appropriate to do so, being reminded that we are good company in our waiting and longing: the whole of ancient Israel, in general, Anna & Simeon, in particular.

Singing our story is helpful to feel less lonely in our waiting, and to be reminded that the coming Christ will restore the broken pieces of the world that prevent our hopes and dreams from being so.
