<u>Terri Lynn's Takes:</u> What's the Enneagram Anyways?

On January 14, Kaytee will lead us in an Enneagram personality study during Adult Education. This informal workshop will be a great resource for our relationships – not only in marriage – but just as much for our understanding of ourselves, and our relationship with God and each other as a church community. But what is the Enneagram anyways?

The Enneagram ('Any-a-gram) is a dynamic system that was developed primarily in an oral tradition, in the context of relationships between students and teachers. It uses a numbering system to describe personality archetypes – and how they relate to one another. At first glance, it may seem rigid and restrictive, "I seem to be an 9, and 9's behave like this". But it is not meant to bind or restrict you to a certain way of being and living. The Enneagram tool is dynamic; it recognizes that humans are too complex and nuanced to fit easily into simple categories. It can help us make sense of ourselves as whole people, and supports the evolving, maturing human journey.

The Enneagram *is* a powerful tool for self-discovery and spiritual transformation. But it's just that – a tool – and could be just one tool in your own tool box that helps you grow as a person and in your relationship with God. And while self-discovery is valuable and worth-while, it *is not* the Enneagram's final objective. The Enneagram's purpose is to help us uncover the traps that keep us from living fully and freely *so that* we will use our unique, authentic gifts for the good of others and the world.

The Enneagram has been tremendously helpful in my marriage relationship, my friendships, my work relationships, and my understanding of my own spiritual journey. Whether you are curious or suspicious, I invite you to join us in this learning time on January 14 at 11:15.

What is Winter and Why do we have Winter? By Jake Buhler

Winter in the northern hemisphere arrives officially on or near December 22 and is usually the shortest day of the year. We call that day Winter Solstice. Solstice in Latin means the sun stands still. Indeed on that day the sun is furthest from the Equator and for a couple of days it seems to stand still before it moves closer to the Equator. Sunlight reaches us at an angle of 23 degrees, and in Winter the rays seem to glance off the earth giving us cold temperatures. But around Osler, the real Winter comes much earlier than December 22. Our high latitude accounts for some of that. We had snow in October and with it came below zero temperatures. The temperatures will remain below zero for months. During this time the sun is low on the horizon and the sunlight hits us at an angle. The days are short. Animals adapt to Winter. Gophers and bats and bears find places to hibernate. Their heartrate slows down and they use up very little energy. Lucky for foxes that field mice do not hibernate because foxes hunt them for food in winter. Some birds like robins and kingbirds that eat insects fly south where there is food for them. Other birds like redpolls and chickadees that eat seeds may stay around Osler and look for pine cones or grass seeds to eat. Deciduous trees that have leaves also hibernate in winter. These trees are 50% water. In winter the trees are able to push water out of their cells into non cell places so they do not die. Pine trees cover their needles with an anti-freeze substance that comes from the tree's sap.

Osler is in a semi-arid zone. For almost 6 months of the year, trees, grasses and growing things require no water. Winter is a welcome change because, without winter, we would not be able to grow crops, have gardens and have trees. The snow we get in winter acts to insulate roots of trees to keep them from dying.

Snowstorms were once very dangerous in the Osler area, especially when horses and sleighs were used, and there was no advance warning about a storm. **On March 13, 1933**, Mr Frank Berg was on his way to church. It was snowing and he was crossing the railway just north of Osler. A train hit the horses headlong, killing them. Nothing happened to Mr. Berg who was in the sleigh. It was called a miracle. Today snowstorms are not very dangerous because we have cell phones, big vehicles and built-up roads.
