Terri Lynn's Takes: ABOUT THE BLANKET EXERCISE

On Sunday June 3, OMC will be hosting a **KAIROS Blanket Exercise** @ **12:30** - Bring a bag lunch for yourself/ your family, and plan to join us, as we journey together as a church community along the path towards reconciliation. The Blanket Exercise is a teaching tool to share the historic and contemporary relationship between Indigenous and non-Indigenous peoples in Canada. Kaytee Edwards Buhler, on behalf MCC SK and others will lead us.

Please come if you are able! Perhaps you have participated in the Blanket Exercise in another setting, or maybe it sounds something you'd try to avoid - but please come if you are able. The hope for hosting a Blanket Exercise at OMC is for us to share the experience as a community, and the common ground of how we respond that experience moving forward. If you have questions or curiosities, please talk to me or Kaytee.

Below is a short description of the Blanket Exercise, summarized from the website: https://www.kairosblanketexercise.org/about/ The KAIROS Blanket Exercise is an interactive learning experience that teaches the Indigenous rights history that hasn't - until recently - been incorporated into our education about Canada's history in a meaningful way. Recognizing that learning this history is an important step forward in walking together towards reconciliation, the Blanket Exercise covers over 500 years of history in a one and a half hour participatory workshop. Blanket Exercise participants take on the roles of Indigenous peoples in Canada. Standing on blankets that represent the land, they walk through pre-contact, treatymaking, colonization and resistance. They are directed by facilitators representing a narrator (or narrators) and the European colonizers. Participants are drawn into the experience by reading scrolls and carrying cards which ultimately determine their outcomes. The Blanket Exercise is meant to engage us on both an emotional and intellectual level. The exercise is followed by a debriefing session in which participants have the opportunity to discuss and begin to process the experience as a group. This often takes the form of a talking circle.

*I requested a reduction in my hours from ¾ to half time. Lots of folks put thought and consideration into how this will work and I thank you.

Reeves in the RM of Warman #374

We have records from 1909 to 1969 showing names of reeves and councillors of the Rural Municipality of Warman #374
From 1909 to 1922, no Mennonites had been elected reeves. Names like Barager, Dekker, Woods, Crane, and Serviss, served as reeves.
In 1923 Abram Driedger from Osler, was elected reeve. He would be reeve again in 1924, 1925, 1926, 1927, 1928, 1929, and 1930. He moved to Dalmeny.

In 1931, JB Boldt of Osler was elected and he continued to be reeve in 1932, 1933, 1934, 1935, 1936, and 1937.

Both Driedger and Boldt were prominent people in the community, and capable leaders. There appeared to be some competition between the two. In 1938, Driedger was elected, and continued in 1939, 1940, 1941, and 1942. In 1943 and 1944, JB Boldt was reeve.

In 1945 FJ Goosen from Dalmeny became reeve.

Then from 1946 to 1956, Clayton Pascoe from Clark's Crossing was reeve. George Guenther, HE Quiring, PP Unger, and Dick Friesen were reeves from 1957 to 1969.

Peter Driedger was a councillor on 5 several occasions but never a reeve. Abram Driedger was the son of the entrepreneurial Johann Driedger (1859-1920) who settled at Osler just before 1905. Johann was an Old Colony Mennonite who was excommunicated from his church for owning a car and for being controversial.

Jacob B Boldt (JB) was the son of Jacob J Boldt who came from Minnesota just before 1905. Jacob J Boldt developed a large farm east of Osler. Both Abram Driedger and JB Boldt were founding members of Osler Mennonite Church in 1928. Jacob J Boldt was also a founding member.

JB Boldt and Abram Driedger were early community figures. They were both members of Osler MC, but there is no evidence in the records of them not getting along as members. They may have taught us that it is possible to hold various views without prejudice and without inflicting harm. Both were Mennonites who came to Osler MC using different routes. We thank them and others for their contributions.
