# Wouth Owl Project in May

As part of their continuing focus on creation care, the Youth will be going out to Bruce Boldt's farm to help him and an owl specialist gather and band baby owls. This is a great opportunity for the Youth to have an up close look at these amazing creatures, since baby owls are quite tame and fit in the palm of your hand. This project will be happening sometime in May and will be finalized soon with the owl specialist.

#### VENT, PROTEST, GRIEVE AND LISTEN.

When a person is wounded, hurt, insulted or abused, he/she wants to talk about it. A rug that has experienced muddy boots needs to be vigorously shaken to get the dirt out. Likewise, the pain and maltreatment needs to be exorcised / shaken out, too, and one of the best ways is to verbally release the injury. Sharing the hurt is a form of protest, and it is a declaration about the personal injustice. Moreover, putting the pain to words invites clarity. Instead of merely groaning, a person has to cognitively choose words to define the condition-- the hurt has to be assessed. And, the protest needs to be heard / received. In a supportive community, listeners can sympathetically validate the grief and/or injustice, and offer helpful feedback, when appropriate. The protest / the venting may be unjustified or from a misunderstanding, and if that is the case, then the listener can help redirect the venting to be more constructive. Either way, emotions need to be released. Nevertheless, grief, abuse and insults need to be expressed to others in order to avoid becoming a trapped victim. We must protest when we are assaulted, no matter the source of the attack.

To be healthy, we must speak out in defense of our personal and community value and integrity. We must not accept abuse or degradation in any form, and we must listen and respond to those protesting and grieving. The path to forgiveness and healing includes venting **and** being heard. Pain and injustices must be exposed before reconciliation and redemption can bring wholeness. Therefore, listen to those who vent, and set your standards high on how you want to be treated. Moreover, attend the Truth and Reconciliation Commission events in Saskatoon, June 21- 24, at the exhibition grounds. We need to hear the stories. The healing and wholeness/peace for our society requires that no one be a victim. And, ignorance makes many victims.

May we all realize that protesting, listening and being informed is a critical part of our salvation journey.

Matthew Thiessen Senior Lecturer in New Testament College of Emmanuel and St. Chad and Lutheran Theological Seminary, Saskatoon Theological Union

#### **Creation Care for Saskatchewan**

- By Mark Bigland-Pritchard

Electricity generation (combustion of coal and gas at power stations):

- 15.5 million tonnes of carbon dioxide equivalent (MtCO2e)
- 21.6% of total provincial emissions
- 14.9 tonnes carbon dioxide equivalent (tCO2e) per person.
- Use LED or CFL lighting instead of tungsten incandescents.
- Replace old T10 fluorescent tubes with T8s, T5s, or LEDs.

• Always choose the most energy-efficient equipment we can find: there are lists for many types of appliance at <a href="http://oee.nrcan.gc.ca/equipment/appliances/12377">http://oee.nrcan.gc.ca/equipment/appliances/12377</a>.

• Don't leave lights or appliances on when we don't need them on. To avoid "phantom loads", use a power bar to switch off electronic equipment when not in use. Use timer switches.

• Avoid using air conditioning if possible. If it proves necessary, opt for the most efficient model available.

• Support the work of Green Energy Project Saskatchewan greenenergysask.ca), which is developing an alternative plan for the province's electricity provision and a strategy to campaign for it.

• Campaign for policies favourable to the development of communityscale renewables development: especially feed-in tariffs, which enable small suppliers to get a stable price for electricity fed into the grid.

• Nearly half of Saskatchewan's electricity feeds heavy industry nearly all mining and oil/gas. Campaign for policies to reduce the substantial energy waste in this sector. And be prepared to challenge inadequately-assessed expansion of these industries.

## Creation Care for Saskatchewan (continued)...

**Energy use in transport** (road vehicles, off-road vehicles including farm equipment, pipelines)

- 14.9 MtCO2e
- 20.8% of total emissions
- 14.3 tCO2e/person

• Use the most energy-efficient mode of transport we can for any journey. Walk or cycle if we can. Otherwise use public transit if we can.

- When we have to drive, try to car-pool
- Start a car sharing cooperative

• When purchasing a vehicle, assess what our actual needs are (not our preferences) and choose the most energy-efficient vehicle which meets them.

• Campaign for planning decisions which make necessary journeys shorter - for example, by getting jobs and shops close to residential areas, and by reducing "sprawl" in new development.

• Buy from local sources - starting with your food (grow a vegetable garden; try to buy food in season; keep alive the skills of canning and preserving; support local greenhouses) but not stopping there.
