#### Pastor's Note:

One of the images or metaphors for God is a parent. In that context, we are the children, and as everyone knows, each child is different. Each child in the same family is unique, and therefore, all children are distinctive. Children have different personalities, abilities, talents, strengths, weaknesses, likes, dislikes and reactions to the world around them. Moreover, even the conditions and circumstances vary, including with siblings. In addition, children vary in maturity level, too. Therefore, God as parent knows to treat each child individually, and that parental care incorporates expectations and responses. This makes sense, yet we "children" tend to have a certain standard or model for what it means to be a child of God. The standard projects a pressure to conform, with the consequences of judgmental disappointment or distain, and that is just simply silly, and at times cruel.

As children, I think God delights in who we are--our place, struggles, progress and station in life, and we know that God doesn't like us to judge each other, either. So, pause and contemplate that it is okay where and who you are--you're growing, and that is what children do.

So, let's embrace that understanding for ourselves and each other. There is no place for berating or bullying--no judging. Let's be God's children, learning and growing together, and that's something worth encouraging.

Gordon recently shared an article with me entitled "Young, emerging, lost or arrested? A review of recent research on young adults and religion", by David F. White of Austin Presbyterian Theological Seminary. In this article, White quotes William Damon, a leading scholar of human development and Director at Stanford University's Center on Adolescence: "Parents and communities that support young people play key roles in helping them to find their purpose....young people need to hear how they can derive personal satisfaction from doing something that makes a difference in the world - even if they don't get public recognition and financial rewards."

This article has inspired me to think about our youth ministry from a somewhat different angle. Are we nurturing our youth, the future adults of our world, to find their sense of purpose in the world? How are we doing this in a way that is different from our self-centered, money and material-oriented world? Are we teaching and supporting them to be Christ-like servants in their world, or to do things for their own gain?

As a church, I believe we can encourage our youth to grow in their sense of Christ-centred purpose by promoting volunteerism. In the year to come, I hope that we as a church can find ways to invite the youth to volunteer. We do this with the Foodgrains Bank Relief Sale and the MCC Relief Sale, but I would like to encourage more. Do you know of someone who needs some help with yard work? Someone who's spirits would be lifted by some freshly baked cookies? Help me come up with ways that the youth can experience meaningful giving and the knowledge that they are needed to be God's hands and feet in this world.



#### Mennonite Church Canada – Ministry Highlights

In the lasts two months' newsletters, we shared some of the work that Mennonite Church Canada does. We told you some ways MCC is dedicated to working for peace and justice, caring for creation, healing relationships with Canada's First Nations, and extending compassion and hospitality to newcomers and those of other faith traditions. Here are some more ways that Mennonite Church Canada, a church-building, faith-nurturing body, a community of over 225 congregations represented by five area churches, serves many peoples.

- 1. Your support of Indigenous Relations (formerly known as "Native Ministry") is helping to build relationships and provide healing across the country. In 2012, delegates to the Mennonite Church Canada Assembly committed to learn about residential school history and the Truth and Reconciliation Commission (TRC) process. Thank you for helping us to walk with our indigenous brothers and sisters on this journey toward healing and hope.
- 2. Over 1/3 of volunteers at the three day Truth and Reconciliation (TRC) event in Saskatoon last June were Mennonites, reports Steve Heinrichs, Mennonite Church Canada Indigenous Relations Director, "and many more from our congregations attended." Thank you for showing your support for our indigenous brothers and sisters.
- 3. Your support allowed Mennonite Church Canada Indigenous Relations to participate in a 4-day event hosted by Mennonite Central Committee Ontario's Aboriginal program to build relationships with Anishinaabe communities impacted by the Mennonite residential schools in north-western Ontario. Thank-you!
- 4. Mennonite Church Canada was able to facilitate 52 pastor transitions for congregations in 2012. Your contributions allow us to build and maintain the data base that makes this kind of pairing possible. <a href="www.mennonitechurch.ca/tiny/1900">www.mennonitechurch.ca/tiny/1900</a>

- 5. In 2012, Mennonite Church Canada entered partnerships with Canadian Mennonite University and Conrad Grebel University College to help students explore pastoral ministry as a vocation and allowed them to work in a congregation for a summer. Thank you!
- 6. "I want to go from here and live and teach a life of reconciliation," said one pastor in response to Palmer Becker's intensive short course on Anabaptism. During September 2012, Palmer served as Mennonite Church Canada Resource Worker inspiring church leaders in Indian and Vietnam. Thank you for your support!
- 7. Mennonite Church Canada helps support the North American Indigenous Institute for Theological Studies (MAIITS), where Christian leaders interpret and practice Scripture and Church mission with an indigenous worldview. Your support has helped overcome walls between cultures and faith.
- 8. Nancy Frey and Bruce Yoder, Mennonite Church Canada Witness Workers have moved from Benin to Burkina Faso to continue their ministry as Formation Resource Workers and grow church leaders. They also work on the pastoral team with the Ouagadougou (capital city) Mennonite congregation.
- 9. In 2012, through the Company of 1000, MC Canada helped support 12 individuals who are considering or studying for ministry. With your donation dollars, we have also been able to establish a partnership with Columbia Bible College to offer two student bursaries for Ministry Inquiry Program internships in the future. Thank you for helping to grow future church leaders!
