Pastor's Note:

The offering bag and electronic giving

Every Sunday, a segment of our worship service is a demonstration of giving to God. We call it the offering. The ushers quietly offer everyone a bag to receive each gift, which is taken to the front as an act of releasing the gifts to God, all the while, the pianist plays a song to add a contemplative feeling. Stepping back from the gifts offered to God, a prayer is given to bless and to give thanks. This ceremony of giving our offering is an important part of worshipping God; however, for most people, the decision to give to God was made before coming to church. Few people decide in the moment if and how much to give. Therefore, the worship ceremony is just that: an intentional act to show our submission to God and our passion to join in God's kingdom. It is spiritual, but it is not the spiritual moment of decision.

A few months ago, we started the option to give electronically by depositing directly into the church's account. A number of people have chosen this method to give to God through the church. Ask Jim if you want to learn more about this. Just like most everyone else, their spiritual decision was made outside of the worship service, yet they are not actively participating in the offering ceremony. The worship committee would like to invite them back into the ceremony and add a new element to the offering ceremony. Note cards are now in the pews, and they are there to allow everyone to participate in the worship service offering. Children and all people are welcome to use them. Consider writing something you are thankful about or write a thank-you note to someone (be sure to address it with the recipient's name). The thank-you notes will be forwarded, in an envelope, to the person you address. The thanksgiving giving notes will be saved. Don't feel you have to put your name on it. This is all about an offering to God, and giving thanks to others and to God is a wonderful way of giving.

May we all continue to rejoice in our giving to God, and may we all be part of this spiritual ceremony of the offering.
