Pastor's Note

Sunday, October 16 is stewardship Sunday. The theme of the morning worship service will reflect this theme, as will the discussion time following a potluck lunch. We generally regard the emphasis on stewardship as simply a request to dig deep into our wallets, and sometimes it has been that way. However, we will not be asked to dig deep, but we will be invited to dig deeper--deeper than our pocket book. Stewardship is spiritual response, and therefore to enhance our spiritual understanding of stewardship, we must dig deep into our hearts.

Many of us recognize the need and express the desire to grow spiritually. Yet, spirituality is not a commodity or energy that can be tapped into as one would drill for oil. The vibrancy of our spirituality depends on the depth of our relationship with God. Spirituality reflects the health of the relationship, and all relationships involve active interaction--giving and receiving. And, that life giving exchange will only happen, can only happen if there is trust. Examining stewardship demands an analysis of our level of trust / faith. Examples: do we believe that God is leading our ministries in our church? Are we being obedient to God's call? Is God lord of all things, including our personal affairs? Will God guide us, provide for us, and do we really trust God? And a big question: are we in control or is God?

Our relationship with God / our level of spirituality is revealed in our stewardship, and our stewardship, also, affects our relationship / our spirituality. As we contemplate stewardship, we will discover an invitation to grow in our relationship with God. Sunday, October 16 could be a pivotal experience in our lives.

*Coffee for Peace now available Percentage of sales donated to Mennonite Church Canada

Winnipeg, Mb: The first ever Canadian shipment of fair trade coffee from *Coffee for Peace* – the Philippines based peace ministry of Mennonite Church Canada worker JoJi Pantoja – is now being offered on a first-taste basis to Mennonite Church congregations and their members. Coffee for Peace (CFP) sells organically cultivated, Arabica coffee grown by small-scale Filipino farmers for fair-trade prices. Distribution has begun through Level Ground Trading Co. of Victoria, B.C., a fair trade organization "founded by four Canadian families for the purpose of improving the lives of disadvantaged producers through trade."

Both as a coffee and the CFP business model have been recognized as a top tier. Joji Patoja, together with her husband Dann Pantoja, provide an extensive and growing Mennonite Church Canada supported peace ministry in Mindanao, Philippines, where Christians, Muslims, indigenous tribes people and the Philippine's military have been embroiled for years in a land conflict. Coffee for Peace beans will be roasted and packaged by Level Ground Trading Co. and sold on a first-come, first-serve basis in 5 lb. cases only (\$100/case). Each case contains ten, ½ lb. boxes. There are 200 cases available and Level Ground will donate \$10 from the sale of each case to Mennonite Church Canada. Originally, plans were to distribute the coffee through 10,000 Villages stores, but the initial "micro-lot" harvest was too small to meet volume requirements. Level Ground recommends ordering whole beans to "enjoy the quality and freshness of this coffee at its optimum". To preserve freshness, orders will be batched and run together each time sufficient orders have been received. Dear Prayer Partners across Mennonite Church Canada,

Many of you may have heard the sad news of Jeff Warkentin's sudden passing late Saturday night, Sept. 24, 2011 as a result of a meningitis infection. Jeff was just 32 years old.

Jeff's passing is all the more tragic because of the swift onset of the infection, his youth, and the young family he is leaving behind. Jeff's wife Tany and their three small children (Danika, 9; Asher, 7; Kenai, 3) as well as their immediate and extended families need our prayers.

Jeff and Tany served with Mennonite Church Canada in Burkina Faso for six years until June of this year. During that time, they developed a large church and community network. Together, they helped to shape the Mennonite Church in Burkina Faso and to nurture leadership for it. They were still employed by Mennonite Church Canada and completing some itineration assignments at the time of Jeff's passing. Keep the Warkentin's Burkina community in your prayers as they grieve the loss of their friend and colleague.

We invite your prayer for the many congregations the Warkentins have connected with and belonged to across Mennonite Church Canada, including those who had partnerships with them in their Burkina ministry and provided them with financial and prayer support. Pray for the good people at Springridge Mennonite Church in Pincher Creek, Alberta where Tany was shaped and formed, and in North Leamington Mennonite Church in Southern Ontario, where Jeff's passion for the church was given root, and Home Street Mennonite Church where Jeff and Tany together were an integral part of the congregation during the years they resided in Winnipeg. Remember as well the community of Canadian Mennonite University with whom the Warkentins were close.

Jeff just had begun a teaching position in Southern Alberta. Although a month with new colleagues and students is a short time, his loss will surely be felt. Please pray that his school community will experience God's comfort and presence.

Jeff had begun to feel unwell on Friday Sept. 23. After coming home from work, he went straight to bed with a headache. During the night, he had a seizure and was taken by ambulance to the Pincher Creek

hospital. The doctor suspected meningitis and immediately administered the appropriate antibiotic. Jeff was then airlifted to the Foothills Hospital in Calgary, where tests verified meningitis and revealed a complete loss of brain function. It was also discovered that he had a rare underlying immune disorder which may have contributed to the severity of his response to the meningitis bacteria.

In an email message, Tany wrote; "God has been a very real presence and comfort to me during the past day. Thank-you to all of you who have already heard about Jeff and have been supporting us in prayer and offers to help. Your love and support are really special to us. Please continue to keep Danika, Asher, Kenai and myself as well as Jeff and my extended families in your prayers as we mourn and adjust to life without our beloved Jeff."

At the time of this writing, funeral plans are pending. Mennonite Church Canada staff is assisting Tany wherever possible. Some congregations Jeff and Tany have connected and partnered with are planning a memorial or other service in Jeff's honour.
